Population: TK-6th grade students with and without identified disabilities, School faculty and families, OT students, OT Professionals
Site: Ascension Lutheran School, Early Childhood Center and Elementary School
Description: My doctoral capstone centered around outdoor education's role in supporting sensory development in children from TK- 6th grade. Throughout my project, I made contributions to Ascension Lutheran School's through developing nature-based classroom resources for children with sensory development impairments.



Needs Assessment | Literature Review

Needs Assessment: The impact of teacher training or coaching on sensory development is limited. Teachers are involved daily with the care of children and may utilize SI and SP interventions to promote their students' development and growth.

Literature Review: The current literature supports that that occupational therapists value the benefits of working outdoors with children in developing sensory skills (Wilkinson et al., 2019). The dynamic nature of having classrooms outdoors creates constant new sensory stimuli to support learning for children (Carter, 2016). Changing conditions and textures outdoors provide many opportunities for children to problem-solve and create engaging social interactions.

Project Completion and Outcomes

Outcome Measure 1: My doctoral capstone project consisted of identifying the role of occupational therapy practitioners in outdoor education, along with the potential influence of outdoor education on sensory development. To understand more about their outdoor education program, Nature Explore, the student spent time observing and assisting in the outdoor classrooms at Ascension Lutheran School. The student obtained more information regarding the needs of the staff on site through my expert mentor and school principal. Additionally, the student spent time researching sensory development, strategies, and therapy in the outdoors. By gathering this information, the student compiled a website along with other educational handouts regarding sensory development and outdoor education to be distributed to staff and families at Ascension Lutheran School.

Outcome Measure 2: In order to endorse occupational performance in the pediatric population with sensory development, the student served on the board of the Garden Team of Ascension Lutheran School since its inception and developed a proposal for an addition to the amphitheater and garden site. The addition consisted of sensory equipment accessible to many ages and disabilities. The student provided resources for progressive nature-based education centered around occupational performance in the school system by designing a curriculum guide along with policies and procedures with a sensory integration outlook in nature-based classrooms.

Mission Statement: To serve and promote occupational performance in the pediatric population through program development aimed at increasing the quality, quantity, and benefits of transformative outdoor learning for sensory development.

Vision Statement: Transforming the school system to provide progressive nature-based education to empower children who have experienced negative sensory processing impairments.

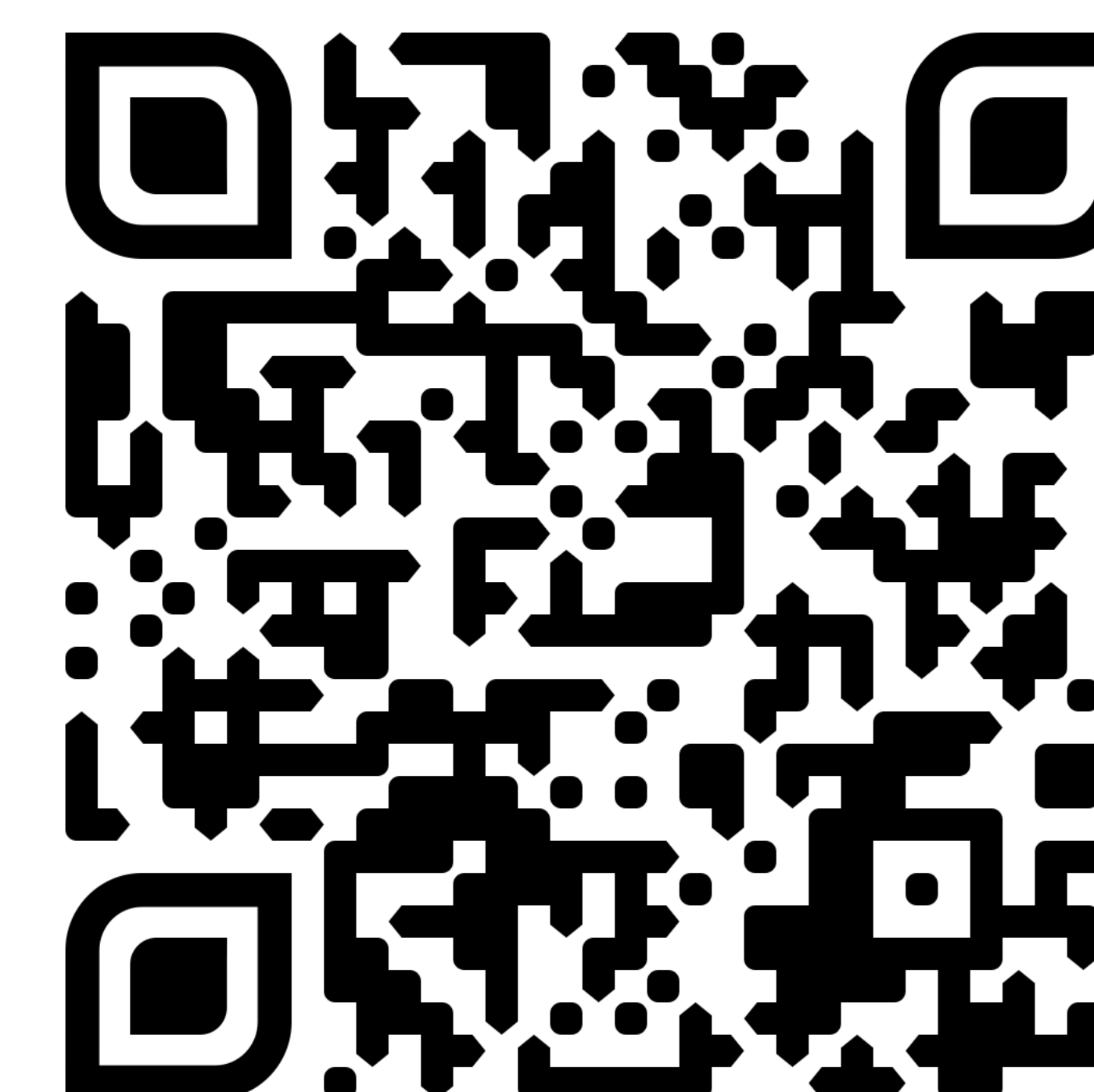


Future Implications for OT
